Focus will be on becoming and creating positive spiritual leaders in organizations. The concepts of Spirituality, Organization, Leadership and Positive Psychology will be explored, defined and integrated to present a model of spiritual care in organizational contexts that work towards Positive Organization Leadership.</p>

Teaching along with Dr. Franzen will be Dr. Harold Mac Wallace who has years of experience in doing Supervisory CPE. Dr. Franzen will function as Dean of Students, and it is hoped that Joel Harvey, Ph.D. will be able to join us in an advisory capacity as Dean for Academic Affairs. The curricular model will be distance learning via the internet, with two or three one-week summer intensive events in which students will bond as a group and engage their academic work from a springboard that combines the experiential with the academic. Practicum courses in their local institutional settings will function in parallel to the academic courses, and the candidates' supervisors of their SIT work in these settings will serve, de facto as adjunct faculty in the doctoral program. This fundamental change in the criteria for reimbursement can offer opportunities for chaplains to demonstrate their value to their institutions. The workshop will explore some of the opportunities in this new hospital care financing arrangement with its emphasis on patient-centered care.</p>
