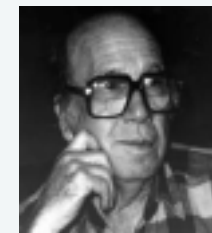

## Featuring...

*"Campbell's Stories"* - Will Davis Campbell was a major public figure in the Civil Rights movement in Mississippi. Born July 18, 1924, in Amite County, Mississippi, Campbell grew up in Liberty, Mississippi — a town name fitting for what Campbell wanted to find through his work as a Civil Rights activist and a preacher. Campbell earned his A.B. at Wake Forest College and a B.D. from Yale.

Campbell served as a Baptist preacher in Taylor, Louisiana, for two years before taking the position of Director of Religious Life at the University of Mississippi from 1954 to 1956. He was forced to leave the university because of his ardent work in civil rights. He later served on the National Council of Churches in New York as a race relations consultant. Campbell worked closely with the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., John Lewis, and Andrew Young towards bettering race relations. Today, he continues his pursuit of spiritual and racial liberty as a pastor in Tennessee.

Campbell's *Brother to a Dragonfly* earned him the Lillian Smith Prize, the Christopher Award, and a National Book Award nomination. *The Glad River* won a first-place award from the Friends of American Writers in 1982. His works have also won a Lyndhurst Prize and an Alex Haley Award.

*"Reflections on 50 Years of Supervision & Counseling"* - The Rev. A Patrick L. Prest M.Div., D.D.

Pat Prest is a former chair and now Professor Emeritus of Patient Counseling, School of Allied Health, Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, VA. From 1958-1990 Pat oversaw the CPE program and taught part-time in the school of Theology at Virginia Union University. In 1968 he was the "founding father" of the Virginia Institute of Pastoral Care. In the 1970's he was a pioneer for licensure of pastoral counselors and served for eleven years at the Governor's request on the Board of Professional Counselors.

A priest for fifty years, he graduated from the Episcopal Divinity School and was the first resident at St. Luke's Hospital, Houston TX, under the legendary Armen Jorjorijan. His great joy has been the success of his graduates as supervisors, pastoral counselors, chaplains, and parish pastors.

*"Christianity and Crisis: An Editor's History"* - Wayne Cowan was Managing Editor, from 1954 to 1986, of arguably the most influential journal on religion and ethics in the twentieth century, *Christianity and Crisis*. He is also the author of *What the Christian Hopes for in Society*, *Facing Protestant-Roman Catholic Tensions*, and many articles and reviews. He was active in opposing U.S. policy in Vietnam, Central and Latin America, and in the civil rights movement, South African apartheid protest, and rapprochement with Roman Catholicism. The collection, *Ethics in the Present Tense, Readings from Christianity and Crisis, 1966-91*, was dedicated to Cowan, "With appreciation for the vision, dedication, and persistence that sustained C&C for thirty-one years.
