

HELEN FLANDERS DUNBAR

HELEN FLANDERS DUNBAR (1902-1959) was the first associate of Anton Theophilus Boisen, who in 1925 inaugurated the first clinical training program for clergy, and ultimately revolutionized pastoral training in virtually all the religious communities in this country.

Flanders Dunbar (the name she liked to be known by in a time when women were often excluded from the inner circle of both medicine and religion) was his most important associate. In addition to her Columbia Ph.D., Dunbar received her M.D. and Med. Sc.D. from Yale and her B.D. (M.Div.) from Union Theological Seminary. She did her psychiatric internships in Zurich and Amsterdam and did much of her work and research here at Presbyterian Hospital in the 1920s and 1930s. Dunbar had a distinguished career as a psychiatrist and author. She published a great number of books, mostly in the field of psychosomatic medicine. Dunbar founded and was the first editor of the journal, *Psychosomatic Medicine*. A preeminent interpreter of the literary works of Dante, Dunbar also was published on the subject of symbolism in medieval thought.

In recent years there has been a revival of interest in the significance of Dunbar's life and works; largely stimulated by the work of Dr. Robert Charles Powell.

... is associate professor of pastoral theology at Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, New Jersey. An ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church (USA), Dr. Dykstra has served churches in the Midwest and worked as a youth minister, hospital chaplain, and pastoral counselor. His special interests include pastoral care and counseling, developmental theory and psychoanalytic psychology, pastoral preaching, human sexuality and the integration of biblical and theological precepts with contemporary research in the human sciences. He is author or editor of several books, most recently *Images of Pastoral Care: Classic Readings* (editor, Chalice Press, 2005) and forthcoming in 2006, *The Spirituality of Boys: Losers, Loners, and Rebels* (co-author with Donald Capps and Alan Cole, Westminster John Knox Press; *Loyal Resistance: The Legacy of James E. Dittes* (co-editor with Donald Capps, Praeger Publishers.)
